GARDENING IN NOVEMBER

Spray roses with "Triforine" to prevent Black Spot. Where space allows between shrubs and perennials, plant zinnias, petunias, phlox, dahlias and other favourite summer annuals. Ensure that their colour compliments the adjoining plants, eg: yellow flowers look great with grey foliage, but not with hot pink flowers!

Cut back Michaelmas daisies to 12 inches so that they grow back and flower better than last year and they won't need supporting.

Divide and plant chrysanthemums and dahlias, nip chrysanthemums to 8 inches if not already done. Lift bulbs if necessary. Plant last of the gladioli and asters. Divide and replant water lilies if necessary.

Mulch with compost where space allows to feed the shrubs.

In the vegetable garden: cut asparagus for eating, plant tomato plants, squash seed, pumpkins, sweet corn, beans, peas, lettuce, parsnips, radish, carrots, beetroot, and silver beet.

Fertilise strawberries, then pack around with pine needles to protect the fruit.

Planting for Eucalyptus Oil Production:

At present Australia produces less than 10% of world production and imports most of its Eucalypt oil from China, Brazil, Africa and Spain. This is mainly low grade oil produced as a by product of the pulp industry.

Preliminary work carried out at Uralla in Northern NSW has claimed amazing results from plantations of selected trees, Eucalyptus radiata, producing up to 750 litres of high grade oil per hectare. In dollar terms, this offers a return of \$6500 per hectare per year. These results were obtained from dense planting at 1.5metres apart in 3 metre rows = 2200 per hectare, all grown under irrigation and harvested every 2 years.

While I would question these results, there still appears to be a very profitable margin by growing the trees conventionally. E. radiata grows locally and is known by some older farmers as narrow leaf peppermint. The naturally growing trees give a yield of about 2% compared to the selected trees at 12%. They are harvested at 2 years by cutting off at 15cm above the ground. They are then allowed to coppice and harvested every year in the spring when the oil content is at the highest. The whole tree is fed into a chipper and then distilled.

Once established a tree plantation needs no maintenance apart from the yearly harvest. A small plantation of 1500 select trees from the CSIRO has been recently planted at Inverary. You may be interested in watching their progress over the next few years.

MICROWAVE RICE PUDDING

75g rice	45g caster sugar
600ml milk	15g butter
100ml single cream if liked	

Place rice, sugar, milk and butter into a large bowl. Microwave on full power for 8 mins, stirring twice. Add cream. Reduce power to medium (50%) and microwave for a further 25-30 mins stirring every five mins. Cover and stand for 10 mins. Serve.

HAVE YOU HEARD?

Dogs Pull The Wool Over The Wild Pig.

Sheep dogs from New Zealand will be used to hunt wild pigs that are destroying the habitat of native animals on the Galapagos Islands. The dogs have already been used to find a rare species of pig in the Philippines and to track wild pigs on the Big Island of Hawaii.

Through the efforts of Colin Clarke from Landcare Research in Christchurch, New Zealand is in the early stages of developing a lucrative industry - supplying dogs to hunt for feral animals. Two dogs bred in New Zealand for handling sheep, the heading and the huntaway breeds, have been trained as pig dogs. New Zealand has about 9000 dog packs. Many of them are used to hunt feral pigs which harm native flora and fauna. The pigs also carry bovine tuberculosis which can infect cattle and deer. One technique that the New Zealanders have perfected is called the Judas pig control. A wild pig, cornered by the dogs, is fitted with a radio collar. When the pig joins other pigs these are tracked and killed on the ground or shot from a helicopter.
