BUNGONIA CHURCH CELEBRATES ITS CENTENARY:

Planning is well under way for a day of celebration and thanksgiving. Consecrated by Bishop Chalmers in October, 1893. Christ Church has been the focus for worship in this small farming community and continues to uphold that tradition for the people of Bungonia today. The sandstone church was designed by Edmund Blacket, architect of the magnificent Anglican Cathedral in Goulburn, and has been carefully maintained through the dedication of

the generations of parishioners. The striking and unique stained glass windows were given in memory of several devoted parishioners and a former rector.

The Centenary celebrations on October 24th will be led by Bishop Neville Chynoweth who will also launch a special centenary edition of the church's history. The service will be held at 10 am. The church will be open all day and a BBQ lunch will be available at a small cost. The day will also be a time of reunion for past and present families and friends in the district. EXPLODING TEA TOWELS!

A message from the NSW Fire Brigades. They have issued a warning to consumers to be aware that cloth kitchen towels used to wipe

or drain large quantities of vegetable cooking oil or salad oil, can catch fire if heated.

Normal laundering may not remove all the oil from the cloth. If these oil containing towels are dried in the clothes drier and left in a pile while still warm or stored in a warm area, they may begin to smoke and ignite.

Fires can also occur with paper towels and other household oils (chemically unsaturated oils such as linseed).

Stan Hearn, Chief Officer of the NSW Fire Brigades said "We have investigated fires that have been caused this way, including a fire at a laundromat, where tea towels used in a restaurant were washed, dried in a drier and then folded up."

To avoid such fires, consumers should always dispose of wiping cloths or paper towels used to wipe up vegetable oil spills, draining foods cooked with vegetable oils or for polishing furniture.

When discarding cloths or towels soiled with oil, do not tightly pack them in the garbage bin. Make sure the bin is in a well ventilated area and not exposed to excessive heat such as direct sunlight or placed near a radiator or stove.

GARDENING IN OCTOBER

Complete mulching of all garden beds with compost to ensure your plants have plenty of feed for spring growth.

Lift tulips intact if their space is needed.

Nip chrysanthemums at 8 inches and Michaelmas daisies at 12 inches to encourage a stronger stem and good flowering.

Plant Virginian stock, petunias, zinnias, gladioli and other summer annuals where space allows.

Divide chrysanthemums, polyanthus, primrose and double daisy.

Ensure roses have been sprayed with "Triforine" to prevent Black Spot.

In your vegetable garden: sow tomato seed under cover, plant peas, beetroot, parsnip, sweet corn and lettuce. Cut asparagus for eating.

INVERARY CREEK LANDCARE GROUP

President: K.M.Cooper

I was approached over the past few months on the economics and feasibility of firewood plantations for future income. While many of local land holders may have ample firewood now available, huge demands for urban expansion in the Sydney/ Canberra region can be expected in the future. Wood supplies may become limited and costly.

Firewood plantations are being trialed by Forestry Dept's. as a commercial crop. Interest in firewood has increased with the development of efficient burners in which most wood burns satisfactorily. Native Eucalypts, Acacias and Casuarina are well suited for firewood cropping.

What is needed are fast growing species with the ability to coppice and regrow for future crops along with the potential for mechanical harvesting. Quick growing species could be harvested under a 10 year cycle.

While there are many suitable species, the choice will be affected by soils, aspect drainage, topography, possible salinity and rainfall. The poorer, less productive soils are probably the most suitable.

In the local area spacing will depend largely on the site, but as a basic guide 4x4 metres is recommended. The site should be ripped and presprayed well in advance aiming at an Sept/Oct

CARROT AND APRICOT MUFFINS

1 eg	1/3 cup apricots (chopped)
1 cup milk	1/4 cup caster sugar
1 cup multi bran	2 tbsp oil
1/2 cup grated carrot	1 1/2 cup S.R. Flour

Beat egg in large bowl and add milk, apricots, sugar and bran. Allow to stand for 5 minutes. Stir in the oil, carrots and flour, but do not beat. Spoon into twelve medium, greased muffin tins. Bake at 190°C for 18-20 minutes.

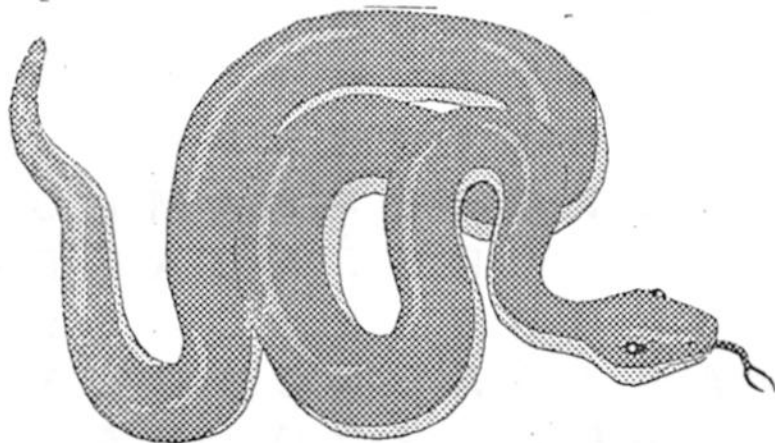

OCTOBER - TIME FOR SNAKES !!!

● October is mating time for snakes after coming out of their long winter hibernation. If you are ever likely to see a snake become cranky, it will be around this time. (Most mating creatures are at their crankiest at mating time as you probably know.) Basically snakes are shy animals and prefer to escape rather than stay and fight. The following are some basic facts about these creatures and why the **RED BELLY BLACK** is really an excellent creature to have around -



Red Belly Black - "the FARMER'S FRIEND"

● **DID YOU KNOW ?** --- The Red-bellied Black Snake -

- Loves nothing better than eating other dangerous snakes (BROWN, TIGERS, etc)
They manage to devour other snakes almost the same size as themselves. In fact,
* if you **REALLY HATE SNAKES**, let the Red-belly black live! - They will kill far more other dangerous snakes than you ever will.
- They also love vermin (rats, mice, etc) so think about it, and save your produce.
- They are very difficult to anger, and mostly only put on show to bluff you.
- If you corner a snake, or tread on it, or start waving sticks at it, etc, you may provoke it to defend itself. **REMEMBER, IT WASN'T COMING AFTER YOU**, it is the other way around, and it will do everything it can do get away without fighting it out.
- If you see a snake, just stand perfectly still or if a little way from it, just quietly retreat, and give it a chance to do the same. Don't worry if it sits up a bit and flickers its tongue, this is how they absorb information. **IT DOES NOT MEAN ATTACK!**
- They have no ears so "listen" with their tongue, and pick up vibrations/movement **NOT** sound.
 - They only have limited eye-sight of approx. 9ft. (The first 3 feet - good, and the last six feet blurred. - so, if you stand perfectly still, you could just as well be a tree or post
- There are no recorded deaths from red-bellied black snakes.
