GARDENING IN JUNE

Well, this is a very quiet month in the garden so take the opportunity to clean up rubbish such as dead grass as it can be good protection for insect pests. If there is a surplus of clean leaves commence making a compost heap. Compost is the cheapest source of organic matter in the garden, also use lawn clippings, animal manure, shrub and tree prunings. Don't use newspaper, fresh sawdust or wood shavings, eucalyptus leaves or pine needles as they can damage the soil.

Start the heap by spreading the material to a dept of 20 cm, then give a heavy dressing of agricultural lime and complete fertiliser, then cover with a layer of topsoil, let the heap build up to a depth of about 1m. Regularly turn the heap, this hastens the decomposition and make sure the compost heap is kept moist, not wet. During the warm weather compost should be ready for use in about 10 to 12 weeks.

Its also a good time to start planting your fruit trees too. We can grow a good variety of fruit trees here but we do have to be prepared to spray them during spring and summer. Remember that some need cross pollination, so ask your nursery when you buy them. Also remember that citrus trees are very difficult to grow in our climate.

Vegetables: the only seeds you can plant are broad beans, peas and onion seedlings, you can plant rhubarb crowns which like plenty of rotted manure, compost, balanced fertiliser and during warmer weather, plenty of water. You can also divide your strawberry plants now.

Flowers: Seedlings which can be planted now will start flowering in the spring. Stock, pansy, viola, primula, wallflower, russell lupins, delphiniums, foxgloves, iceland poppies, sweet william and calendula.

If you have a garden bed that is not being used, turn the soil over regularly to open it up. The frosts will sweeten the soil for spring planting.

Budget

Council's draft budget for 1999/2000 is currently on exhibition at Council's offices, the library in Goulburn and the post office at Marulan.

It provides the detail of what Council intends to spend on what and where in that year.

If you have comments or objections about any aspect of it, you are invited to lodge a written submission by mid June. (Please check the exact closing date with Council).

Rates

The budget includes an increase of 2.4% in your rates for next year. This is that amount announced last month by the Minister for Local Government as the allowable increase State wide. The small amount that these extra funds will generate will not allow for much by way of extra works - it will be eaten up by steadily rising costs.

It would be nice if the grants that Council received from State and Federal Government, for works like maintenance of regional roads, also rose by 2.4% but I won't be holding my breath waiting for that.

We expect to have EFTPOS facilities in place at the office by the time rates payments are due.

Clinton Street Building

Council's purchase of the "new" building in Clinton Street, Goulburn, is looking like quite a wise investment.

The bottom line in next year's budget indicates that it is paying for itself through the lease of the top floor office space and lease of the old Montague Street building.

On Site Sewage

I have written previously about the State Government's new requirements for all septic tanks and other on site sewage management systems to be registered with Council and for inspection and maintenance programs to be developed.

This system is coming onto operation from 1 July

1999, so if you have not yet completed a registration form for your septic system, please contact Council as soon as possible and do so.

In the meantime, we are doing our best to make it as simple and cheap for you as possible. Registration will cost you nothing at this stage and, in most cases, inspection and maintenance will be possible by "self assessment" means but you need to attend a workshop to become "qualified" to be a self assessor.

It sounds a bit strange, but it seems that's the direction we will have to take. The alternatives could mean you having to find a qualified soil scientist to inspect your on site system, and could be expensive!

Some areas in the Shire have been classified as environmentally sensitive in regard to sewage systems, including the Bungonia State Recreation Area, and these will need more rigorous attention.

Oallen Ford Road

Bitumen sealing of this road along the sections that have been widened and re-aligned has been included in next year's budget.

I am expecting the work to be done next spring. In the meantime, please keep driving carefully.

Local Government elections are scheduled for 11 September this year. The Local Government and Shires Association is holding free seminars in various locations around the State for anyone who is considering standing for Council.

S.E.P.P.58.

1st. February may be significant for any farm planning including farm forestry as we are in the Sydney Catchment. SEPP 58 applies to all development applications as from 1-2-99, every proposed development within the catchment will be assessed for it's effects on water quality. Details can be obtained from Council or DLWC. SEPP 58 combined with the Native Vegetation Act and Farm Dams Policy can have a big impact on any proposed farm development.

N.S.W. PLANNING.

Policies are under review -- the main facts coming from a Seminar in Queanbeyan and others held around the State are as follows, This is a very brief resume of the meeting I attended:-

- * Need for uniform Council regulations.
- * Simplification of applications.
- * Bottom up approach to planning.
