Annual General Meeting Secretary's Report

During the year 10 meetings were held with an average attendance of 7 members. We welcome all new members and thank all who supported the Association during the year, especially Cr. Ina Evans whose presence at meetings and encouragement and informed contribution has been of great value.

The Association organized a number of functions, a Christmas Party, Market Days and a Community Garage sale. The profits from these events was used to defray Community Hall expenses, such as insurance etc., and for general maintenance and upgrading of the Hall. We have purchased new tables and chairs for the Hall and Cherie and Dennis Jenkins generously donated a deep freeze for use by the Progress Association and the Rural Fire Service. We appreciate your support.

The Mulwree Council again supported the Association financially by donating the equivalent of the Council rates, and by attending to matters raised by the Association. A major Council project in the district has been to establish unique addresses for rural properties and as part of that project all roads have been given unique names. The council has kept the Association informed about all new road names and asked for suggestions for the roads in our area.

Again our thanks to Allen Travers for keeping the Bottle Bank area clean and tidy and for removing rubbish from the Hall after Market Day and other functions.

A village beautification program is being developed by landscape architect Louise Gell of Michael Bligh & Associates and the Progress Association has the responsibility for co-ordinating the various organization and individual interests in the plan and for making the plan publicly available for comment and eventually, its implementation. We hope it will provide a useful basis for applications for any appropriate grants that are available.

The Village Hall is an important community asset and is being used regularly. We hope that in the coming year more residents will participate in the Progress Association and help with fund raising and other activities. The Hall needs major work on the roof and it would improve the appearance and, more importantly the heating, if a ceiling were installed. Another major repair needed is to replace the floor in the supper room. Money is available through grants but someone has to prepare and submit them for the Association. As well the more money the Association has the greater the possibility of being given a grant.

During the coming year one of the main items for discussion and implementation will be the Village Beautification Plan. This is an exciting project and will have a major effect on the appearance of the village and indirectly the value of property and all residents are invited to take part.

GARDENING IN SEPTEMBER Continued

Lettuce – like friable soil which holds moisture and drains easily, varieties for cool climates are Imperial, Triumph, Yatesdale, Imperial, Mignonette, and Sunnyside.

Silverbeet – excellent to plant in early spring, this will help to keep healthy leaves coming until autumn is planted in a sunny aspect.

Cabbage – used to be planted as a winter vegetable but now we enjoy eating them in salads and coleslaw's. Sugarloaf is still an excellent quick maturing variety but Superette is worth growing for its large solid heart.

The list is endless for planting vegetables in spring, not only for the wonderful growing season but also to save money, having your own fresh vegetables and maybe for bartering! Everyone can grow something that someone else can't, this is a great opportunity to swap vegetables.

Lawns: it is also time to look at your lawns, after winter lawns are left looking dull and have a few bare patches. New growth will start in places and weeds will appear as well. Broadleaf weeds and bindii will cause problems too and there are many chemicals to help with this. Before you treat your lawn give it a good watering on a warm day to activate the sap in the weeds, this makes the chemical more effective, follow the direction on the chosen chemical, mix about a tablespoon per 10 litres of water of household detergent in with it to assist the coverage of chemicals. To rejuvenate your lawn apply a balanced or complete fertiliser and water in very well. September is also the time to plant new lawns too.

GARDENING IN SEPTEMBER

This should be one of the busiest months in the garden and it is not too late to add compost or well decomposed animal manure to both your vegetable or flower gardens.

Flowers: this month because of the changeable weather, some days are warm and pleasant but others can be cold and frosty, you can plant seedlings of violas, verbena, dianthus, carnations, stock, wallflower, dwarf sweet william, nemesia, polyanthus and for that early summer display of petunias and phlox. Many people ask will petunias stand frost, well yes they can as long as they are acclimatised, and this also applies to phlox.

Gladioli bulbs can no be planted too. they like a garden containing compost and plenty of sun and good drainage. They usually take 90 days to flower. The best way to plant the bulbs is over a period of 2 to 3 weeks and that way you will have a display for longer. Plant the bulbs 12cm deep for heavy soil and 20cm deep for sandy soil this is because if the bulb is planted too shallow, when the flower buds start to form, the weight is likely to make the flowers fall over. A light dressing of complete fertiliser ensures large healthy flowers.

Also watch for the thrip bug which is a sucking insect which sucks the sap out of the plant which will destroy the flowers. Spray the gladioli with Rogor or Lebaycid when the plant is 8-10cm above the ground and weather is very hot and dry. This can be done every 2 to 3 weeks.

This is also a good time of year to purchase your Chrysanthemums or take cuttings and well established plants can also be divided during September. If the weather during summer and autumn is overcast and very wet, chrysanthemums can be affected by fungus disease. The bottom leaves may turn brown and drop off and the top leaves show signs of black spot. Spray with Benlate or Zineb.

Vegetables:

Carrots – lots of varieties but Topweight, Western Red and All Seasons varieties are resistant to virus disease. They all like a soil that is light and deep. If you have shallow soil, King Chantenay, Early Horn or Baby carrots are the ones to plant. Another good idea for helping seeds to germinate is to mix coarse sand or seed raising mixture through the soil to a depth of 10mm, sow the seed and then lay hessian bags over the top, this will help the surface to keep damp. Remove the bags when the seeds have germinated.
