## **GEOGRAPHICAL NAMES ACT 1966**

Notice Of Proposal To Create A New Locality, Redesignate and Define Certain Assigned Names and Amend Locality Boundaries Within Mulwaree Shire

PURSUANT to the provisions of section 8 of the Geographical Names Act 1966, the Geographical Names Board hereby notifies that it proposes to name and define the new locality *Boxers Creek*. The Board proposes to redesignate as locality and define the boundaries of the assigned historical localities Baw Baw, Carrick, Chatsbury, Kingsdale, Lower Boro, Myrtleville, Pomeroy, Richlands and Woodhouselee. The Board proposes to amend the boundaries of localities Bannister, Big Hill, Brayton, Greenwich Park, Gundry, Marulan, Middle Arm, Mummel, Tarago, Taralga, Tarlo, Towrang, Wayo, Wiaborough, Wollogorang, Wombeyan Caves, Yalbraith and Yarra, which may affect boundaries of adjoining localities. These names and boundaries within Mulwaree Shire, as shown on map GNB3786, compilation date 15 March 2001, are to be used as the address.

THE MAP may be viewed at Mulwaree Shire Council, Taralga Post Office, Marulan Post Office, The Loaded Dog Hotel Tarago and the office of the Geographical Names Board, Land and Property Information, Panorama Avenue, Bathurst.

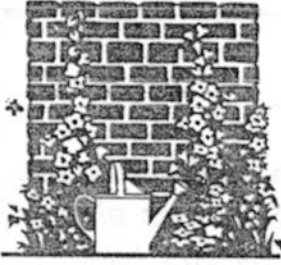
#### HERITAGE PHOTOGRAPHS ON DISPLAY

# Gardening in September

September can be one of the busiest months in the garden and its not too late to add compost or well decomposed animal manure to both your vegetable and flower gardens.

Flowers: This month because of the changeable weather, some days are warm and pleasant but others can be cold with light frosts. You can plant seedlings of Violas, Verbena, Dianthus, Carnations, Stock, Wallflower, Dwarf Sweet William, Nemesia, Polyanthus and for that early summer display Petunias and Phlox. Remember that Petunias and Phlox can stand frost as long as they are acclimatised.

Gladioli bulbs can now be planted in a garden containing compost and plenty of sun and good drainage. From the time of planting, Gladioli take about 90 days to flower, and if you have a good quantity of bulbs, try planting them out in small groups, 1- to 14 days apart to ensure that you have continuous flowering for a long period of time. If the soil is heavy, plant the bulb 12cm deep or if light and sandy 20cm deep, if they are planted too shallow the flower buds weight is likely to make the flowers fall over. Give them a light dressing of complete fertiliser when planting and this will ensure a healthy growth and flower.

Insects do attack Gladioli and the most troublesome is the thrip, which is a very small sucking insect and makes the plant appear to be burnt and flowers sometimes distorted and not opening properly. When the plant is 8 – 10 cm tall spray with Rogor or Lebaycid.

New Lawns: September is the time for starting new lawns, but remember not to rush into planting. Take your time in preparations. Most of our soils here are heave so give the area a dressing of lime or gypsum and cultivate to a depth of 8 – 10cm. Do this if possible 2 to 4 weeks prior to sowing the lawn, this helps eliminate weeds. Just before sowing, cover the areas with good sandy loam to a depth of 8 – 10cm if necessary. A light dressing of lawn starter before sowing will ensure a healthy vigorous green lawn.

## What's Best to Sow?

*For soft green lawn all year round:*

Canberra Blend (a mixture of Derby Fine Rye & Kentucky Blue.

*Lawn that will stand up to lots of wear and little maintenance:*

Playground Mixture (a mixture of Perennial Rye Grass, Bent & Fescue)

After sowing the seed, use a hair broom to cover the seed, remember is seed stays on the surface it will still germinate. It is essential to keep the soil moist for the first 2 weeks to establish the lawn using a hand held spray. Don't use sprinklers as too much water can cause erosion, seed rising to the surface and uneven distribution of seed.

When the lawn is 4cm high, a light mowing can be carried out and thereafter reduce the height of the blades, and if your soil is very light and deep, a light rolling will compact the seed bed.

Vegetables: time to plant the seeds of carrots, parsnips, lettuce, silver beet, onions, cabbage, peas, potatoes and radish or kohlrabi.

## C.P.S. GRANT SYDNEY CATCHMENT AUTHORITY

We have been fortunate in gaining another grant for \$8000.00 plus equipment hire for further farm forestry trials in the Spring Creek Catchment. This will enable a further 8-10 hectares to be planted this winter on already prepared country, and will include *P.brutia*, *P.canariensis* and *P. pincaster*, as well as *P. radiata*. The preliminary trials of *P.pinester* are looking quite promising as an alternate species to *radiata* on very dry sites.

## LATEST ON R.E.P.

The document "Sustaining the Catchment" which caused so much opposition when put forward by the Sydney Catchment Authority has been partly revised and once again put to the public for comment. Meetings at Braidwood and Goulburn have been a little more positive, but there is a lot of opposition. Opponents of the change and proposed new regulations should realise change will come irrespective of any opposition and they now should concentrate on the positive outcomes and what concessions can be obtained. Local communities stand to benefit in many ways by the new R.E.P. – there will be a big injection of funds for rehabilitation. Tree plantings and earthworks aimed at better water quality and possibly a lot more opportunities for joint ventures schemes.

## POSSIBLE CONCESSIONS ON ENVIRONMENTAL WORKS.

Recent announcements by the State Government features a strong emphasis on market based solutions to land degradation, salinity, biodiversity and water problems. There will be more money available for joint ventures and incentive schemes for conservation on private land. The native vegetation policy may even be liberalised to allow some clearing of native vegetation to be offset by rehabilitation or protection on other areas on the property. This should slot in quite well with the Landcare group policy of extensive farm forestry plantings where some areas of depleted native vegetation can be replaced by economically sustainable plantations.

The department of Agriculture is trialling a pilot environmental service credit scheme where environmental or salinity credits can be traded. In the future some landholders may be actually paid for producing good water quality they undertake the necessary rehabilitation works and change land management practices.

The idea of environmental credits is not new overseas where it seems to be working quite well, so lets hope it is embraced here. As I have stated before there is a need for a huge injection of funds into improving the environment and halting land degradation. When the new R.E.P. is finalized I think we will see some of the above concepts adopted to the benefit of all
