The Rural Action Group is co-ordinating the response to the Environmental Impact Statement accompanying the Development Application for a sand and hard rock quarry at Ardmore Park. The quarry would generate 80 truck movements a day within two years or less and be operating 5am to 10 pm Monday to Friday and 5am to 6pm on Saturday. Don't feel helpless or resigned to the disruption and intrusion, send a letter to the Minister. **Community action has stopped similar developments elsewhere so protesting is not spitting into the wind.** The Rural Action Group will provide information and assistance. The watering system is partly installed and now that the Christmas break is over that job can be finished. Thank you to Ron Wadell for the use of his ripper to dig the trenches.

The play area is attracting more visitors and we really need more equipment (a slippery dip and another swing) which means applying for another grant.

At Home With The Recorder

It's a serious musical instrument with its own repertoire, ranges in length from 15cm to two metres, and in the Southern Tablelands there's professional tutelage now available.

The instrument is the recorder, which has been around since the 13th Century, and the tutor is Catherine Weaver, who recently moved to the Marulan area from the Blue Mountains.

Their prime motivation was acreage, which pleased her husband, a radio ham, no end.

Catherine [B.Mus., Dip.Ed.] is fully qualified and experienced teacher who performs professionally on all sizes of the recorder.

She started playing at the age of 10, studied at the Sydney Conservatorium of Music, and in 1987 gained a performance degree in Recorder.

She started teaching at the age of 17, and her students now range in age from 5 to 84, including a number of children from Bundanoon, Wingello and Marulan, and adults from Moss Vale, Mittagong and Canberra.

Between times Catherine performs with the Berrima Singers, and plays recorder with them.

In January this year, eight of her students will participate in the Armidale "Steps in Time" recorder festival, which will attract 500 participants from Australia, New Zealand, Japan and Great Britain.

The festival will include the national recorder competition finals.

RURAL ROAD SAFETY

Student travel safety an issue for local areas

Schools are back from holidays and all drivers and parents are urged to take extra care on school days no matter where they are.

Conversations with community members indicate that serious road trauma involving school children is an issue of great concern and not just in school zones. School children are vulnerable for considerably longer periods in the day than many people might think, such as catching buses on high speed rural roads or walking several blocks to and from school.

Behavioural research has revealed that young children can behave impulsively and unpredictably around traffic and their spontaneous behaviour can over-ride road safety knowledge and safe pedestrian practices which parents and teachers have imparted to them.

No matter where they are, drivers and parents can do a number of things to reduce the likelihood of a school student being seriously injured:

Drop off and pick up children from the same side of the road as the bus stop;

Obey the 40 km/h speed limit around school buses and in school zones (8:00am to 9:30am and 2:30pm to 4:00pm on school days);

Park legally near schools and walk with children to the school gate;

Supervise children under 10 years, especially when crossing roads;

Always hold the hand of children, especially those under 8 years of age when crossing roads; and

Slow down in areas where there are children walking or playing.

VALE

We have been saddened by the death of three ex residents of Bungonia. Dick Tickner died suddenly in November, Doug Brideson, after a long illness, in December and Dave Broadhead, following a series of strokes, also in December. These three men contributed service to our Community over a period spanning 50 years or more. We owe them a debt for their part in building our organizations and developing the facilities that they helped to build or were instrumental in constructing.

Dick Tickner was always there when a grave had to be dug; he willingly gave shearing demonstrations for fund raising, provided the first set of flag poles for the War Memorial and drove the "tucker box" for the then Bush Fire Brigade, just to mention a few of his deeds. Dick taught himself to weld, was fascinated by machinery and could repair most engines. He also had a collection of old tools which he displayed at fund raising events. He had lived at "Glen Loss" on the Jerrara Road most of his life and was a quiet man, although he liked a chat, who just did the things that he perceived should be done.

Doug Brideson amongst a lot of other things will always be remembered by Bungonia residents for his part in getting the CEP programme grant in 1984. This changed the way we looked at things. Money from the grant augmented by local funds paid for the mowing of the public areas in the village, building a toilet block at the Hall (I doubt if the authorities would have continued to licence the Hall without the new toilets), the BBQ in the Park, a new Tennis shed, replastering St. Michael's Church and repainting Christ Church, a new fire shed and removal of the dangerous pine trees in the Park.

Dave Broadhead was a founding member of the Bush Fire Brigade, a Park Trustee, a member of Progress Assoc., the Cemetery Committee, the Rifle Club, an active member of the Bungonia Anglican Church and a very active member of the Parents & Citizens Association. In fact Dave was a very active member of any group and raised a lot of money for the various organizations to which he belonged. The present generation has built on their achievements and as you drive through the village past the Park, the Fire Station, the Hall, the War Memorial, the Churches & the Cemetery, remember these men and be grateful for their wonderful service to our District.
