## Horse - ing Around

### Part Two – Stable and yard care.

There are many reasons to stable or yard a horse. You may need the horse close for treatment of an injury or illness, foaling or breaking in and training. A paddock will always be the best place to keep your horse for its health and happiness but not everyone has this option. Spell your horse at least once a year in a large paddock for several weeks with no rugs or shoes on quality grass. This is like a holiday and you know how good you feel after a holiday. Horses are like us and get depressed, stressed and bored this is called sour. A sour horse will be stubborn, cranky and or listless. This leads to lack of appetite, poor health and bad habits such as crib biting/wind sucking, eating own manure, pacing, swaying, biting and kicking. Being stuck in a confined space for long periods of time would send anyone or thing crazy so remember this if your horse is stabled or yarded.

**Rule one:** when keeping your horse in a small area is exercise! Ride, lunge, walk or release into a larger area each and every day, rain, hail or shine. The only exception would be an ill or injured horse that the vet has confined. A good grooming will not go astray in this case. Grooming stimulates the blood flow in skin and muscles and relaxes the animal (who doesn't enjoy a massage?)

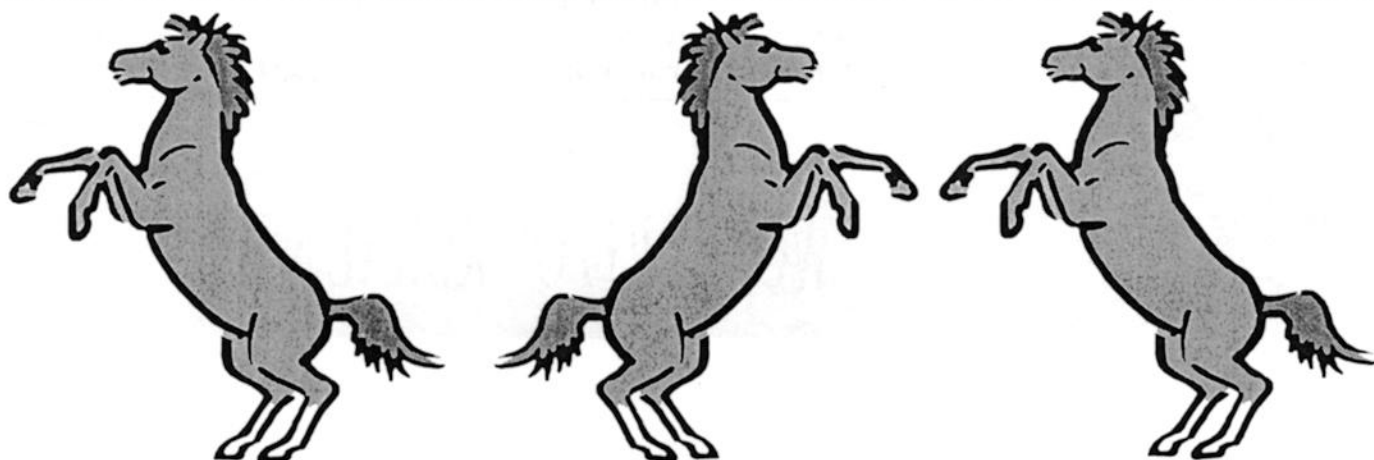
**Rule two:** always keep the stable and or yard clean! Pick up manure each and every day twice is even better. Keep bedding clean and change often. Bedding is important to health. Some horses will eat straw or be allergic to the dust in it. I like shaving best it lasts longer, is kind to legs, (good support) is fairly easy to get and not too pricey.

**Rule three:** clean, fresh water daily. Moving around in the stable or yard will kick up dust into the water and because the horse hasn't far to move to water it will not finish its mouth full of feed and drop grain into the water. This will ferment and contaminate the water fast especially in summer.

**Rule four:** Remember to feed the horse morning and night. Don't over feed or give an over grained diet for required exercise. Too much grain will have your horse doing summersaults with you on. (not fun) It can also effect his health leading to azoturia,(Monday morning sickness) laminitis,(founder) swelling of the joints and colic. Supply a salt/mineral block. Give plenty of good quality hay in a net this keeps food off the ground and slows eating, making the animal work a little harder for it. There are many "toys" available for horses. Licking devices, balls ect, but you can add home made one like empty plastic milk containers hanging from the roof. The horse will chew it and swing it for hours. Just like us horses get lonely too. Having another horse or buddy close helps with company. We have a radio on and the horses hang close to it so we assume they like it.

**Rule Five:** this is my rule, if your horse is rugged make sure you remove all rugs often and give him/her a good grooming. Nothing beats it for a great coat, good muscle tone and this is your bonding time with your best friend. If I find time in a day to groom a horse I consider it a good day. If I find time to ride and groom it was a great day!

Next Meeting : Monday, 11<sup>th</sup>. September, 2006

**Ardmore Park Quarry;**

CEAL have lodged a revised proposal to reduce the scale of the development and designed to reduce the traffic and transport impacts. The new scale of development is:

- Phase 3 of the projected deleted
- Phase 2 reduced from 56 truck movements a day to 48 truck movements a day
- Phase 1 remains the same ie. 28 truck movements a day
- The hours of operation for the quarry 7am. to 6pm. and transport hours 7am. to 6pm. Monday to Saturday, 52 weeks of the year. No operations on Sundays or public holidays.
- Road works to be carried out during Phase 2

At the General Meeting on 15<sup>th</sup>. August, the Goulburn Mulwaree Council adopted the motion "That the revised proposal to establish a quarry at "Ardmore Park..." in its amended form **not be supported** as the traffic impacts have not been satisfactorily addressed".

**The revised CEAL report and the Planning & Community Services report and recommendation are part of the Council's Business Paper & Enclosure Documents available at the Library.**

The Land & Environment Court Registrar has directed that the proceedings come before a judge of the Court for "case management" on 29<sup>th</sup>. August. **This is not hearing the appeal** but is simply another procedural hearing where the Court (this time a judge) will make directions as to the conduct of the proceedings.

It has been confirmed in writing by the Dept. of Planning "that, in sufficient time before the hearing, all persons who lodged a submission on the original D/A will be notified and given the opportunity to comment ON significant changes to the development."

**WHAT CAN YOU DO TO HELP ? IT IS ESSENTIAL THAT EVERYONE WHO CAN, GOES TO THE HEARING WHEN IT OCCURS.**

Progress will arrange a bus when the date is known. While the case will be determined on its merits the presence of all who objected will help strengthen the point that this is a community issue and that the people who objected, did so because they feel very strongly about the issues raised in their objections.

**When the date is known cancel all other arrangements and attend the Court.**

We will keep everyone informed.

**Hall Extensions:** These are completed and once the final inspection is completed and all relevant certificates issued and keys handed over, final payment will be made.

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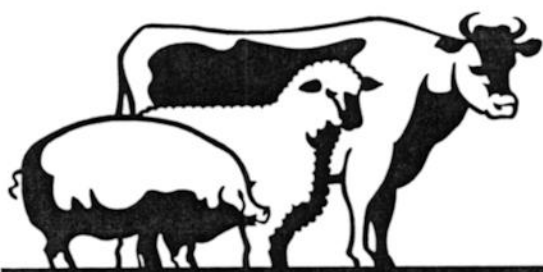
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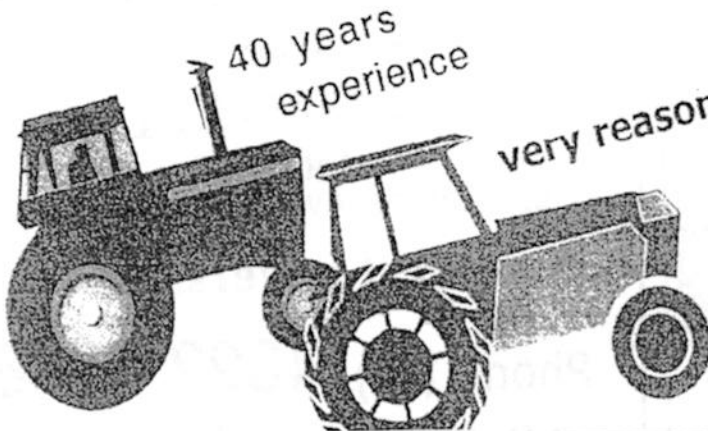
